

Overview: Young Women of Toledo

Our Young Women initiative offers an opportunity for intersectional and young women ages 12 to 26 to share, discuss, and debate constructively to help build skills and empowerment.

Under the Young Women of Toledo initiative, we introduce Girls Hub Circle, a STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics) program/activity for girls and young women ages 12 to 17 that offers a dedicated workspace in design and construction, through classes in carpentry, architecture, and civic art. With support from our STEAM mentors, our Girls Hub's Builders use their creative voices and power tools to build their chairs, which represent their uniqueness, while examining the value of identity, voice, and lived experience in civic spaces.

We aim to support and equip a community of fearless builders. Integrating Mentor's technical skills, we believe our programs equip youth with the personal power and literal power tools to build the world they want to see.



Did you know? Toledo is known as the Glass City--a history goes as far back as the 1880s, when the canal system opened up manufacutring opportunities for glass-makers who moved here and created world-renowned glass products. Also, glass is a permanent material which is infinitely recyclable!

Community Impact Feminist Fellowship



Six to Ten-weeks Fellowship Program

Twenty-first-century education, both in the United States and globally, is faced with the realization that there needs to be a growing emphasis on alignment between how our youth are educated, what and how they learn, and how they are prepared for the world beyond the classroom. Our LeadHerWay Fellowship program is an opportunity for intersectional youth, ages 17 to 24, in our community to explore John Dewey's famous three-part purpose for education.

According to Dartmouth University, providing Fellowship opportunities to young women is associated with many benefits, including:

- Practical Experience The unique responsibilities and project work associated with a fellowship program will help our participants develop the skills and experience required to work in a real job. Many employers consider the fellowship instead of entry-level work experience.
- Professional Development Fellowship programs also offer extensive professional development opportunities. Participants will learn public speaking, community organization, media relations, and leadership skills.
- Financial Support Fellowship programs are also associated with monetary benefits. Most participants receive up to \$3,000 for 6 to 10 weeks up to 250 hours.
- Research Fellowships are great for participants who wish to pursue research in a specific field.
- Personal Confidence Winning a prestigious fellowship will boost your confidence and motivate you to take leadership positions at top universities or corporations.
- Invaluable professional networks introduction to professional leaders in their fields. Often, fellowships include training, mentorships, and other networking opportunities to connect fellows with executives, speakers, and mentors.
